# ASCLS Legislative Symposium A Trip to Washington, DC

For those of you who have watched The West Wing, you'll remember the optimism portrayed in the show. It was witty, inspiring, poignant, and often made one empathize with the staffers trying to do what they thought was best for the country. Far be it from Washington to be a polarized place, even in a fictional TV show. TWW has episodes that frustrate viewers with scenes of obstructionism and unwillingness to work with the other side. Popular media and the news further reinforce the belief that Washington is where ideas go to die. The reality is that Washington hosts some of the best ideas and thinkers in the world. A lot of those great ideas come from constituents of Congress. This past October, a group of Minnesota constituents came to Washington with theirs.

Admittedly, I was nervous when my plane touched down at Reagan International Airport, as I had never lobbied on Capitol Hill before. I thought one required the right suit, tie, connections, and words to be a lobbyist. The Legislative Symposium changed my perspective on lobbying. There, I learned about citizen advocacy and its importance. It turns out that most legislation Congress passes is bipartisan, including laboratory-focused acts. Further, members of Congress and their staffers enjoy hearing from their constituents. In their eyes, constituents know what's best for their local community. Meeting with community members gives congressmen and women a glimpse of life in their district or state. As medical laboratory professionals, we have a unique perspective to offer when discussing legislation. I did not need to feel intimidated by elected officials, as we are considered the experts in laboratory needs.

My fears left after being prepped at the symposium. Because I went with a delegation of Minnesotans, I assumed I would only need to do a little talking. However, when we arrived at my congressman's office, everyone in the group turned to me to begin our conversation with his staffer. I was nervous, but I told the staffer about my laboratory experiences. While I told stories, I saw the staffer's face soften. Hearing someone give a laboratory issue a personal connection helped solidify our asks of Congress: support clinical laboratories nationwide.

Participating in democracy allows our government to see the humans behind the issues. Our diverse Congress has physicians and nurses in its ranks but still requires the expertise of its medical laboratory professional constituents. I encourage every laboratory professional to participate in democracy at the local, state, or federal level. Making our voices heard is the best way to make a difference for the lab. President Bartlet from The West Wing put it best: "Decisions are made by those who show up." Laboratorians let's show up.







## The Value of Volunteering at Any Level

# **REGION V SYMPOSIUM HIGHLIGHTS**


ASCLS Wisconsin was a wonderful host for this year's **ASCLS Region V Symposium**, which was held at the Lismore Hotel in Eau Claire, Wisconsin on September 28 and 29th. The best part of the meeting for me was reconnecting with Region V friends from North Dakota, South Dakota, Wisconsin, and Minnesota. Many are colleagues that I have met over the years and some that I have not seen since the arrival of Covid. Of course, there were new friends to make, networking to be done and to be honest, just a chance to relax and enjoy the meeting!

There was a full slate of sessions and speakers, which made it difficult to decide which sessions to attend. Kudo's to the planning committee for putting together such a wonderful program!

The keynote speakers were terrific with very timely topics! Dr. Pat Tille (ASCLS-President Elect) spoke about leadership being transient change (The Key Performance Indicators of a Successful Leader) and how strategic leadership changes the present in order to create a desired future. It was a new way of thinking about change and why it is so important that change occurs. Susan Stalewski shared an important aspect of advocacy (Advocacy for Medical Laboratory Science: What is Your Value Proposition?) that we can all engage in every day. How do we share the story of what we do and why and how it is important in our everyday conversations. Miles Thompkins (Director, ASCLS Board of Directors) shared what he sees as some of the reasons impacting our laboratories including burnout, workforce shortages, etc (A Breakdown of Breakdowns: What's Tearing the Laboratory Sciences Apart and How to Put it Back Together Again) but from the perspective of how things we are doing that might be part of the cause and therefore how we can be part of the solution.

One of my favorite sessions was put on by the Region V Leadership Academy graduates, **Clayton Fraker** (WI), **Jessica Fry** (ND), and **Elizabeth Jones** (ND). They shared their wonderful leadership Academy project, in which they pulled together the broad range of professionals who are part of the medical laboratory community and the types of work that they do by sharing real stories from a variety of different laboratory professionals. They shared their personal stories from the more traditional path to the not so traditional path to get to their roles. Their final project will be up on the Region V website and will be able to be openly shared with others including school counselors as a way to invite students to join the profession.

Of course, one of the largest benefits for attending an in-person meeting like this is the connections we make with our peers and the chance to visit with vendors, who really go "all-out" to support our meetings and for which a lot of networking and education happens in the vendor hall, too!





Recent studies indicate nearly 1/3 of managers in the core lab planned to retire in the next five years. For some areas like hematology and microbiology, that percentage is higher. As an entire generation of laboratory professionals leave the workforce, younger, less experienced laboratory professionals are being pressed into service in management positions they didn't train for. A need exists to prepare these professionals to take on new roles.


